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according to the washington post no one who cares about contemporary african american cultures can ignore bell hooks electrifying feminist explorations targeting cultural icons as diverse as madonna and spike lee outlaw culture presents a collection of essays that pulls no punches as hooks herself notes interrogations of popular culture can b

in the critical essays collected in black looks bell hooks interrogates old narratives and argues for alternative ways to look at blackness black subjectivity and whiteness her focus is on spectatorship in particular the way blackness and black people are experienced in literature music television and especially film and her aim is to create a radical intervention into the way we talk about race and representation as she describes the essays in black looks are meant to challenge and unsettle to disrupt and subvert as students scholars activists intellectuals and any other readers who have engaged with the book since its original release in 1992 can attest that s exactly what these pieces do

roger a sneed offers an alternative approach to black homosexuality for black religious scholars who have traditionally viewed homosexuality as a problem instead by drawing on a range of black gay writers representations of homosexuality points black religious scholarship towards an ethics of openness

though there is no biological validity to race it continues to play a central role in various aspects of our daily lives what then generates and reinforces the reality of race and in what ways in order to explore these questions this book examines racial representations from both scientific and humanistic perspectives taking into account both historical and contemporary views this incisive anthology is the product of an interdisciplinary collaboration among scholars from japan korea singapore germany israel iraq and the us the discussion consists of studies in history literature sociology cultural anthropology and genetics while the primary focus is on racial representations in asia the book elucidates issues and phenomena that have been neglected or marginalized in the literature on racial representation and it serves to broaden our understanding both in the theoretical and empirical realms looking at these phenomena it is realized that racism has become increasingly obscure and harder to identify and articulate thus posing the question are we really beyond race and heading towards a future of integration

in 1920 w e b du bois cited the damnation of women as linked to the devaluation of motherhood this dilemma he argues had a crushing blow on black women as they were forced into slavery black womanhood portrayed as hypersexual by nature became an enduring stereotype which did not coincide with the dignity of mother and wife this portrayal continues to reinforce negative stereotypes of black women in the media today this book highlights how black women have been negatively portrayed in the media focusing on the export nature of media and its ability to convey notions of blackness to the public it argues that media such as rap music videos television dramas reality television shows and newscasts create and affect expectations of black women exploring the role that racism misogyny and media play in the representation of black womanhood it provides a foundation for challenging contemporary media s portrayal of black women

since 1997 representation has been the go to textbook for students learning the tools to question and critically analyze media texts and images this long awaited third edition has been updated throughout to engage with the impact of digital technology and culture and the changes in political culture social movements and the cultural industries the new edition includes a new preface by sean nixon focusing on digital media and theories of representation a new afterword by kobena mercer to stuart hall s classic chapter on the spectacle of the other revised chapters with additional content on digital media de westernising culture imperialism and blm and new readings tying contemporary issues of race gender and power a new chapter by nancy thumim exploring digital forms of self representation and representation in of politics looking at media spectacle political imagery the me too movement and black lives matter the third edition provides an indispensable resource for students and teachers in cultural and media studies

precarious empowerment sexual labor in the coffee shops of chile s santiago provides a textured and telling exploration into the lives and experiences of sex workers in chile their encounters with discrimination and economic precarity and their empowered resistance set in and around tinted cafes spaces hidden from public view where women dance for their male clients and perform sexual services within chile s capital city of santiago author pilar ortiz traces connections between sex work in the present day and the lasting legacies of colonialism and gender and sexual norms drawing on her careful ethnographic observations and in

depth interviews with the workers and their clients the book reveals the many challenges women face at the intersection of class racial and gender inequalities it also documents their resistance to stigma and stifling social norms and predetermined gender roles in their practice of sexual labor the book argues that women display a considerable degree of agency mobility and empowerment within this contentious space the author explores how sex workers negotiate inequalities and exclusion and how they are poised to do so in a rapidly changing political and social climate exploring experiences of exploitation and resistance within chile this book speaks to the much larger question of agency versus oppression in conversations about sexual labor worldwide its compelling analysis will captivate those interested in scholarly studies of sexual labor and the ways it is performed and shaped across hierarchies of race class and gender

even with increased attention to refugee women s issues in the late 20th century post colonial discourses have nurtured limiting representations of refugee women predominantly as subjects of charity and as victims adding to a growing body of work in the field the author challenges this preconception by offering an opportunity for women s voices

crossing borders and boundaries countries and cultures they are the children of the military diplomatic corps international business education and missions communities they are called third culture kids or global nomads and the many benefits of their lifestyle expanded worldview multiplicity of languages tolerance for difference are often mitigated by recurring losses of relationships of stability of permanent roots they are part of an accelerating demographic that is only recently coming into visibility in this groundbreaking collection writers from around the world address issues of language acquisition and identity formation childhood mobility and adaptation memory and grief and the artist s struggle to articulate the experience of growing up global and woven like a thread through the entire collection runs the individual s search for belonging and a place called home this book provides a major leap in understanding what it s like to grow up among worlds it is invaluable reading for the new global age

movies matter that is the message of reel to reel bell hooks classic collection of essays on film they matter on a personal level

providing us with unforgettable moments even life changing experiences and they can confront us too with the most profound social issues of race sex and class here bell hooks one of america s most celebrated and thrilling cultural critics talks back to films that have moved and provoked her from quentin tarantino s pulp fiction to the work of spike lee including also her conversations with master filmmakers such as charles burnett and julie dash reel to real is a must read for anyone who believes that movies are worth arguing about

artists have long been fascinated by film but recent decades have seen an explosion in direct artistic engagements with mainstream cinema particularly from the classical and post classical eras of hollywood filmmaking ranging from directly sampling film clips to imitating aspects of films these engagements deploy highly recognisable examples of cinema to activate collective cultural memory artists moving image presents a diverse and wide ranging body of works from established artists such as steve mcqueen and douglas gordon to mid career artists like jesse jones and rachel maclean reinvigorating the existing canon of cinematic artists films beyond discussing individual works sarah smith categorizes and analyzes the trends in this expanding area of art practice arguing that the point of interest is not cinema and its history per se but what its evocation as cultural archive can illuminate about the legacies of the past in the present examining subjects such as found footage as feminist poetics the documentary turn in contemporary art and the unfinished film she shows how artists films interrogate dominant cinematic forms and their cultural meanings for anyone interested in contemporary art film studies or exhibition practice this book is a defining exploration of how cinema operates as twentieth century archive in recent artists moving image

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the second edition of melanie bush s acclaimed everyday forms of whiteness looks at the often unseen ways racism impacts our lives the author has interviewed and surveyed hundreds of college students and reveals that even though we talk as though we

live in a post racial world after the election of barack obama racism is still very much a factor in everyday life the second edition incorporates new data and interviews to show how the everyday thinking of ordinary people contributes to the perpetuation of systemic racialized inequality the book introduces key terms for the study for race and ethnicity reveals the mechanisms that support the racial hierarchy in u s society then outlines ways we can challenge long standing patterns of racial inequality

implicitly the essays show how the souls of black folk has influenced teaching practices and suggested alternative ways of teaching that create a pedagogy of inclusion

if it can be argued that young people construct their identities through the social formation of boundaries then it is important to uncover how social cultural and political boundaries are created and lived through popular music this is both a pedagogical and political concern

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
